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A story of hope & love for our troubled world

All over the country, all over the world, in the last weeks of December and the early weeks of January, there are people – many of them tiny children - acting out the story of Christmas.

Here in Bridport the newborn baby Jesus is welcomed each year in a retelling of the nativity, in schools, community centres, and in churches, too.

At the Bridport Nativity – involving many churches and so many in the community - you'll find all the usual suspects: shepherds (well, men, women and small

children wearing tea towels on their heads); fleecy alpacas posing as camels; tinsel-clad angels; blingy three kings; a shy donkey who is never ever persuaded to come into church (I mean the stable); and a star shining from the top of our tallest actor's head, pointing the way.

The Bridport Nativity happens, just as the nativities everywhere happen, sometimes with hilarious mishaps along the way, but always, somehow, conveying a message of hope and love.

We always try to recruit a newborn to play the part of the infant Jesus for the Bridport Nativity. One year we had an eight-week-old who slept through the whole thing peacefully, even when the brass band reached fever pitch! Another year it was a two-and-a-half-year-old, who ran around, dancing when we sang carols, delighting everyone!

And usually hundreds of people, many of whom rarely step inside a church, enter

from vet more Christmas shopping.

I wonder if in the Palestinian town of Bethlehem in the West Bank or in Gaza this Christmas, communities might gather to retell the story, despite all that is happening in our war-torn world. Or in Ukraine, Sudan or Syria.

Last year, a priest in Bethlehem said: "If Jesus were born today, he would be born under rubble."

This age-old story, which can often seem remote and distant – a fairy tale, even, on some days – is not a story just for the church. It is for everyone, it belongs to everyone. And it is told every year in all kinds of places, even places of conflict.

If you let it into your heart, the story is very real and very near. It is a story set in a country under occupation, of a family forced to flee their home and become refugees. A story we often make cosy and twee, which in fact speaks of welcoming in new life, new hope, in the midst of fear and uncertainty.


For some new hope feels out of reach. And yet, we tell the story of Christmas once more, a story of hope.

On that first Christmas it was local. It was personal. God had come near in a very specific place. That happens every time we allow the story to be a part of our lives - and that's the whole point, isn't it? That God comes to us locally, personally, into the mess of our lives.

What changes with the birth of Jesus is this: God becomes flesh. God moves among us in a specific, local, eating-and-drinking kind of way, in the person of Jesus.

And somehow, the power of that story of love and hope, against all the odds, shines through in those countless re-tellings in school halls, perhaps amid the rubble, and in churches every year... and it is happening again this Christmas!

I pray for hope and peace for all this Christmas. Canon Deb Smith

Inspired by the Channel 4 television series The Piano, our own Piano at St Swithun's is a monthly event at the church, usually held on the second Saturday. We started in April and have been amazed by the response we have had and the performances we have enjoyed.

We do our best to foster a warm, informal atmosphere. Far from expecting musical perfection, we encourage enthusiasm and enjoyment over everything else in a way we hope reflects the spirit of Richard Godfrey's generous gift of our Estonia concert grand piano.

The spontaneity of some of these performances has added hugely to the experience of our audiences, who often sit in wonder at what they have stumbled upon. We also find that some pianists prefer to play during our intervals or towards the end of the recitals when the audience is not listening intently.

Our special thanks go to a number of regular pianists who have supported us through the year. Without their dedication we could not be sure that any of the events would go ahead. Many of these players practise new pieces weeks in advance, while others improvise, displaying skills honed over many years. Some play favourite classical pieces, others play music composed for the theatre, unusual early music, or even works they have composed themselves. We have been treated to short talks about music in St Swithun's of yesteryear and we have musicians of all ages coming to play.

So please come along — either to play or to listen! Although everyone likes to respect the performances by not distracting our pianists, there's no need to stay from the beginning to the end. Tea, coffee and often cakes are available during the interval, usually just after 11am. It's something different and interesting to do on a Saturday: an opportunity for reflection and a haven from the bustle of town.


There's entertainment for the whole family to enjoy, including, in Bucky Doo Square:



FURNITURE RESTORATION

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A statement from the Bishop of Salisbury following the resignation of Justin Welby as Archbishop of Canterbury

I, together with Bishop Karen and Bishop Andrew, respect the decision of Archbishop Justin to step aside from his role as Archbishop of Canterbury and will continue to pray for him and his family. Archbishop Justin has taken personal and institutional responsibility to enable deeper change.

The Makin review has exposed horrific abuse and misuse of power over many years. Questions out of this report must be addressed by the church in a trauma-informed way, which places victims and survivors at the centre of it. In recent days the focus of debate has moved away from this, so I would ask us to refocus our attention back to the experience of victims and survivors and the lessons we must learn from doing so.

In this diocese we will continue to work to implement good safeguarding practices, supported by clergy and volunteers in our parishes and advised by our professional safeguarding team. We remain committed to engaging with victims and survivors of abuse.

I offer this prayer which sustains me daily:
Thanks be to you, our Lord Jesus Christ,
for all the benefits you have given us,
for all the pains and difficulties you bear with us.
O merciful Redeemer, friend and brother,
may we see you more clearly,
love you more dearly,
and follow you more nearly,
day by day. Amen.

BTC hears about residents' priorities for the town

Over the summer, Bridport town councillors visited various venues, community groups and events to engage with local residents about their priorities for the town.

This formed part of the consultation for Bridport's next five-year plan, which guides the council's activities, outlining key projects that we will undertake alongside our ongoing services, and supports the annual budget-setting process and long-term financial planning.

The feedback we received was wide-ranging, but certain issues were raised more frequently:

- Positive views on local events making Bridport a welcoming and eventful town including the carnival and torchlight procession, hat festival and charter fair
- Calls for support for activities aimed at young people, especially teenagers, and the creation of more social spaces
- · Complaints about overgrown footpaths
- A desire to protect and maintain green spaces
- A demand for more social and affordable housing, especially housing for younger people rather than retirement communities
- Concerns over infrastructure, particularly GP services, with the growth of large developments and the impact of retirement communities on local services
- · Calls for action on speeding in residential areas
- Enhancing pedestrian experience in the town
- Concerns about the appearance of the town centre, including issues with weeds and maintenance
- Frustration over the number of vacant shops and the dominance of charity shops
- · Complaints about high car parking fees
- Concerns over sewage discharge issues into the rivers and sea
- A need for revitalisation of the bus station and more reliable bus services
- Difficulty accessing further education, with colleges too far away and travel costs high, leading young people to move away or not pursue higher education.

These concerns will be taken into account as we continue planning for the town's future. While some issues fall within our ongoing work, many of the larger issues such as education and housing are outside our direct control and are the responsibility of Dorset

Council or the national government. However, we acknowledge our role in advocating for these matters at higher levels of government.

The full council will review the priorities in November and finalise the five-year plan, which will then be published on our website. If you would like to discuss any issues that matter to you, we encourage you to attend one of the upcoming ward drop-in sessions. These informal events provide an opportunity to speak directly with your local councillor. You can find dates for these sessions, along with details about your ward, ward clerk, and ward councillors, on our website at www.bridport-tc.gov.uk.

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A holistic approach to education: former headteacher David Brazier



This month we meet a newish member of the community. David Brazier has had a successful career in education and retired to Walditch this summer after more than a decade as head of a boys' school in Surrey. We met him at his new home to hear how he and his wife are settling in...

The Bridge: David, welcome to Bridport - and to Walditch! What brings you here?

David Brazier: We moved here from Beaconsfield. We'd sold our home there but weren't quite sure where we wanted to move to - first we started looking for a second home in Totnes, as we liked the vibe there. Then we discovered that some friends had bought a campsite in Broadoak. We went to stay with them there and really liked it - and particularly Bridport. We looked at some houses and just fell in love with this one in Walditch, so we bought it and moved here in July.

TB: How are you settling in?

DB: I like the countryside, the sea and the beach and I feel blessed to be here. Everyone has been very friendly and within a week of our arrival we'd been invited to a garden party. My wife, Lizzie, a garden party. TB: It sounds like you're going to be busy here, even though vou've retired from your career in education. What led you into teaching?

DB: One of the most important influences on my life was Dr Kathleen Raine, an expert in the work of William Blake, and herself a poet and scholar of enormous philosophical vision. I wrote to her when I was studying Blake at university and she invited me to her home in London; we went on to form a deep friendship and I felt she had adopted me as her 'spiritual grandson'.

Kathleen understood the 'great battle' of life to be between deadening materialism, in which nothing is sacred, and living 'in the light of the Spirit'. She summed this up using Blake's words: "Everything that lives is holy." She was driven by a vision of Spirit-led education, and in her 80s she established Temenos, a charity that offers education in philosophy and the arts along the principles of the sacred traditions of East and West.

She was an extraordinary woman who animated a room with her

being – and she changed my life. I'd gone to university in my late 20s, after a few years working in industry, and my friendship with Kathleen made me resolve to become a teacher.

TB: How did you establish yourself in this field?

DB: Initially I went into prep schools. I loved teaching and I always strove to bring what I'd learnt from Kathleen and Temenos to my work, teaching in an imaginative vein. I loved the classroom but I also enjoyed life at independent schools, with sport in the afternoon (I love coaching cricket) and grounds that keep the pupils in touch with nature.

I had a few head-of-department posts then I was headhunted by the Cognita group of independent schools set up by Chris Woodhead, who was the Chief Inspector of Schools in England in the 1990s. I got my first headship at Long Close in Slough, where I worked to change the cultural values of the school and establish a new ethos of inspirational teaching.

Then in 2013 I saw an advert for the headship at St James Senior Boys' School in Ashford. They were looking for someone with an interest in meditation and philosophy, and I saw an opportunity to bring my two interests together and offer pupils a fully holistic education.

TB: And you got the job...?

DB: I did – and I stayed there until my retirement this year. The St James schools were founded by

David Brazier's holistic approach to education continued

Leon MacClaren, an economist, teacher and philosopher who espoused the principles of Advaita Vedanta – simply put, each human is 'pure awareness', a pure and perfect being. In this context the job of an educator is to remove impediments to light. The school incorporates meditation and mindfulness into each day, and, unusually for UK schools, pupils also learn Sanskrit.

Happily, a holistic approach to education is becoming more mainstream – the Mindfulness in School Project was set up 15 years ago to teach children this vital skill – but at St James reflection and meditation have been embedded for decades. This was my dream job.

I'm proud of what I achieved during my 11 years at St James – visitors to the school would say they could feel the special energy. I ended my working life feeling complete, like I'd achieved what I was sent to earth to do.

TB: Do you think boys do better in single-sex schools?

DB: Yes, I think they do. They stay a bit more innocent and they don't align themselves with girls.

TB: How does the experience of pupils at St James differ from your own schooldays?

DB: I went to a Seventh-day
Adventist school, where there was
lots of Bible study, but I wanted
a more direct experience of the
spiritual life. I had a lively mind
but I've always valued stillness
and later I took up meditation
and studied Sanskrit. As the years
have passed, I've kept an interest
in Christian theology alongside
other philosophies, and I have an

inclusive attitude to the spiritual – I've learnt that there are many paths to God.

TB: What about your own children? Have they followed you into education?

DB: My son Peter has – he teaches economics and maths at a school in London, where he also coaches cricket, just like his dad did!

My daughter, Grace, is a project manager in the construction industry, also in London.

Lizzie is my second wife. We knew each other when we were at school and we went to a drama club together. I always wanted to ask her out! Then after my first marriage ended, I found her on Friends Reunited and we fell in love.

West Dorset Beekeeping Association is the bee's knees for apiarists across the area

Members of West Dorset Beekeeping Association have been meeting for an astonishing



134 years to share their craft.

The charity draws its members from across West Dorset and provides free advice and support on all bee-related matters to members and the general public. In the spring and summer, members of the association are regularly called on to collect swarms and identify bee colonies that appear in local gardens. It's surprising where they choose to settle – air bricks, post boxes, nest boxes, compost bins and chimneys are all popular.

The main annual showcase for WDBKA is the bee marguee at the Melplash Show. It hosts a hotly contested honey show with an interesting array of exhibits. The observation hives offer visitors a safe glimpse into the heart of a colony and additional information points help to promote awareness of biodiversity and the vital role of all pollinators. The show also celebrates the true value of local honey and its provenance, offering taste tests using cheap supermarket honey alongside honey from the club's colonies to illustrate the difference between the two.

The association has its own teaching apiary in Netherbury. Student beekeepers help to look after the bees, and the honey harvest is sold to raise funds to maintain the colonies and provide equipment. Both full members and friends of the association are free to visit when the apiary is open, and beesuits are available to borrow – in

fact, everything is provided except for wellingtons and a pair of rubber gloves! A monthly email newsletter keeps everyone informed about the club's events.

This year WDBKA has been raising awareness of the imminent threat of the Asian hornet and the devastating impact it can have on all insects, not just honey bees. Chairman Peter Crabbe is also the Asian hornet co-ordinator and is very happy to visit interested groups to talk about the Asian hornet. Peter can also help with monitoring this invasive pest and is available by email at asianhornet@westdorsetbees.org.uk.

A key part of the club is the promotion and sharing of knowledge. Good beekeepers never stop learning and the bees always have something new to share. The WDBKA annual course for new beekeepers is a popular, costeffective route into beekeeping. Student feedback is always very

complimentary and praises the enthusiasm and commitment of the tutor team as well as the high level of enjoyment the sessions bring. Sally Boxall

WDBKA's next course starts on Tuesday 4 February and comprises seven evening theory meetings at the Christian Fellowship Hall followed by three tutored sessions in the club apiary. 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

The town council recently considered a planning application for a 'retirement community' development

of 45 apartments and 28 cottages at the JC Phillips site off South Street. Councillors are very unhappy with the proposals and have submitted a strong objection, focusing on the need for more affordable housing, rather than more open-market retirement accommodation. It's Dorset Council that decides the application – Bridport Town Council is consulted and can make comments but doesn't make the decision, which we expect to be made in December or January.

On 10 November the town centre hosted the annual Remembrance Sunday parade, which saw a great

turnout of participating organisations and residents, all led by the mayor of Bridport, Cllr Anne Rickard. A service of Remembrance followed at St Mary's Church. The town council organises the parade on behalf of the Royal British Legion, and particular thanks go to my colleague Claire for arranging another poignant, dignified and respectful event, which reminded us of the service and sacrifice of so many.

A story for Christmas

The Gift of the Magi is a short story by the American writer O Henry and was first published in a New York newspaper in 1905. Henry, whose real name was William Porter, was a pharmacist as well as a talented writer. He suffered from poor health throughout his life and died in 1910 at the age of 47.

The story, set in the early 20th century in New York, is about a young American married couple, very poor

but deeply in love, who want to buy each other a Christmas present.

On Christmas Eve the young wife has only the very modest amount of \$1.87 in savings.

However, she has beautiful (and fashionable) long brown hair, of which she is immensely proud, and she decides to sell it to a high-society wig maker in order to buy her husband a platinum chain for his fob watch, which is a valuable family heirloom and his most prized possession.

When her husband arrives home from work she gives him the gift, admitting that she bought it by selling her hair. Her husband then presents his Christmas gift to her – ornamental hair combs, which he bought by selling the fob watch.

By their mutual actions the young couple show how much they love each other. The story ends with the

narrator declaring that people who sacrifice their material possessions for those they love are as wise as the Magi.

To this day, people visiting O Henry's grave in Asheville, North Carolina, leave \$1.87 in coins, which the cemetery gives to local public libraries.

December and January gardening jobs:
Look after visiting wildlife and prevent ponds and bird baths freezing over. To avoid risk of rot, reduce watering of plants that are overwintering under cover. Prune tall bush roses to guard against windrock; prune wisteria and other vigorous climbers. Continue to plant and winter-prune fruit trees and bushes; take root cuttings from perennials; take new-year hardwood cuttings of trees and shrubs. Chit early potatoes and start sowing early vegetable crops and some summer bedding plants under cover. Warm the soil with cloches for early seed-sowing outdoors. Clean pots and seed trays ready for the joy of spring sowing.

Featured plant of the month: hellebore
Hellebores are classic plants for winter interest, with
elegant, nodding blooms in shades of green, white, pink
or ruby (some examples are pictured below). These
perennials have a long flowering period, lasting well
into spring. Mainly evergreen with handsome leaves,
they thrive in shadier spots.

Thelma's hymn notes

It Came Upon the Midnight Clear

This carol was composed by the Revd Edmund Sears (1810–76), an American Unitarian minister from Massachusetts. It was first published in 1849 and is widely though to be Sears's response to the recently ended war between the USA and Mexico.

The carol's words speak of "the woes of sin and strife", "man at war with man" and "life's crushing load" – and ultimately of a time when peace will cover the earth. As well as reflecting on the Mexican war, it also foretells the horror of the 1861–65 American Civil War, in which more Americans died than in any other conflict before or since. Although the carol is no longer as popular as it once was, the words are sadly still very fitting for today's world.

The traditional English melody was adapted by Sir Arthur Sullivan (1842–1900), best known for his operatic collaborations with the librettist and dramatist WS Gilbert, producing the famous HMS Pinafore, The Pirates of Penzance and The Mikado.

Let us hope for peace around the world in 2025.

The ward clerk writes...

Thank you to all those Bothenhampton and Walditch residents who took the time to complete and return the 20mph survey that was delivered with the October issue of The Bridge. In total, 179 responses were received with 95% of respondents supporting a reduction in the speed limit from 30mph to 20mph for certain roads in the ward. The next step for Bothenhampton & Walditch Ward will be to liaise with the town council's other wards that are considering 20mph speed limits. It is likely that the town council will need to commission traffic surveys to obtain upto-date traffic data on those roads being considered for 20mph before a single Bridport parish 20mph application can be submitted to Dorset Council.

I am pleased to report that Dorset Council has been quick to act on a couple of recent issues in the ward. First, following the fall of a branch in September that blocked Walditch Road, Dorset Council's highways department issued a tree report and met with the owner

of the land on each side of the road to explain the action that needs to be carried out on the trees lining the road to ensure the safety of the highway.

Second, after a resident got in touch about some tyres dumped on Lower Walditch Lane, I reported this issue to Dorset Council's waste management team and the tyres were removed in a matter of days.

If you spot a problem on a road or pavement, you can report it to Dorset Council using their online portal: www.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/w/report-a-problem-on-the-road-or-pavement. Issues that can be reported include drainage, flooding and gully clearing, potholes, hedges, trees and verges, abandoned vehicles, weeds and moss, fly-tipping and graffiti, street lighting and footpath and bridleway issues. When reporting an issue online, photos are always helpful.

The next Bothenhampton & Walditch Ward public engagement session will take place in January but if you would like to discuss any items of interest or concern in the ward with your ward councillors in the meantime, you can find their contact details online at www.bridport-tc.gov.uk/wards/bothenhampton-walditch-ward. Ministry Aviation Fellowship

Holy Trinity has enjoyed a long relationship with the Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF) and the congregation collects used postcards for them to help with their fundraising. On Sunday 23 February, Dr Luc Vandamme, MAF's regional coordinator, will visit the church and speak during the morning service about the organisation's activities. Working in partnership with hundreds of other Christian and relief organisations, MAF delivers practical help, physical healing and spiritual hope to some of the world's most remote and inaccessible communities. Its pilots fly their light aircraft to more destinations than the six largest airlines in the world combined, landing on desert and jungle airstrips, lakes and rivers, tracks and roads to provide a lifeline for some of the world's poorest people.

Bradpole Forster Village Hall

On 7 October the trustees held the annual general meeting of the hall, which is a charitable incorporated organisation. Seven members of the public were also

there. Sarah Kilcoyne, chair of the trustees, outlined the work that had been done in the past year or so, some personally by the trustees and some by contractors. The list included general redecoration of the main hall, entrance, kitchen and toilets; new ceiling tiles and overhead lighting in the main hall; a new set of crockery in the kitchen; and a general tidying. Trustees hope to find a more suitable place to store the tables and chairs, leaving more space in the hall.

The trustees were grateful to the parish council, (which ceased to function on 31 March) for donating some funds to the hall and supplying a bench, which has been installed outside. Some of the money had been spent on a clock, the design of which is in keeping with the age of the building, and the rest will be used for general maintenance.

Treasurer Colin McReavie presented the accounts for the year to 31 August 2023. There was a healthy cash balance at the end which has been maintained this year. A good number of organisations use the hall but there are still slots available. The new online booking system will be available and Alan Smart, a local resident, volunteered to monitor it on behalf of the trustees. Users of the hall were asked to report any problems to the caretaker, Jim Bryant (427493), when they arose so that he could deal with them quickly.

A call for another trustee was answered by Douglas Baldwin, who had been a trustee a few years ago.

The defibrillator, which is installed outside the hall, is now being maintained by Bridport Town Council and people were encouraged to use it in appropriate circumstances, not to be put off by the thought of using it because there are simple instructions and it can save lives. Sandy Goldsmith, secretary of the town council's Bradpole Ward, gave a vote of thanks to the trustees for the work they had done and continue to do.

In the new year, it is hoped to arrange for a speaker from Dorset and Somerset Air Ambulance to give a talk to an open meeting in the hall about the work of the air ambulance, and to give a demonstration of resuscitation and the use of a defibrillator.

Many of you are aware that yet again an HGV vehicle tried to enter Bradpole village via Lee Lane and was thwarted by the bridge. The lane had to be closed overnight to allow recovery of the vehicle. Councillors are working with Dorset Council in the hope of installing clearer signage at the junction of Lee Lane and the A35 and to consider whether they could take any other measures to avoid a reoccurrence.

The service was conducted by the Revd Cally Burch, Pioneer Vicar, with the Revd Lorna Johnson, Associate Priest. We also celebrated the first Holy Communion of three newly confirmed young parishioners, Miriam Digy, Josfin Komi and Christopher Foote, who had been confirmed the previous day with over 50 others by Bishop Andrew at Salisbury Cathedral.

The collect started with the moving words: "Almighty God, you have knit together your elect in one communion and one fellowship in the mystical body of your son, Christ our Lord."

Cally gave a short but profound sermon revealing how all those present were saints. She also talked about the early death of her talented artist cousin, who left behind three masterpieces – her three daughters – as well as a devout Roman Catholic schoolfriend whose passing had prompted an annual school reunion of her peers. We were all reminded to remember every saint across the globe and up and down the ages, past, present, future.

The ward clerk writes...

Ward councillors have been pressing for action on 'joyriding' and other speeding problems in the area over the past few months. At their last public meeting, councillors were asked about the possibility of traffic calming on West Bay Road, and they are looking into that with the help of Dorset Council, who would make any decisions on taking it forward. There would be public engagement on the idea so the community will get its say, and we know there will be differing views. It's more likely that we'll see a speed limit reduction on Station Road, which is seeing more and more pedestrians using a narrow lane that currently has a 60mph limit.

Councillors are also pressing Dorset Council and the police for action to address joyriding in the Station and West Bay Road car parks. This longstanding problem has proved difficult to resolve: police resources are limited, and things like locking-up times and height barriers present as many problems as they solve. However, your town councillors are determined to see more attention paid to the matter, which is both antisocial and dangerous. A reminder to residents to report your concerns – call 101 if not urgent, or 999 if a crime is in progress. Not every call will result in an

immediate influx of flashing blue lights, but the buildup of reports for a particular area will affect how often you see patrols in West Bay.

The town council manages West Bay Car Boot Sale on Sunday mornings from April to October, and puts all the stall fees into a grants fund, which is now open for applications for 2024–25. Forms and guidance can be downloaded from www.bridport-tc.gov.uk/services/annual-grants and the closing date is Monday 6 January 2025 at 9am.

Friends and fellowship bring hope at Christmas

Sitting looking out of the window while writing this it's difficult to believe there are only a few weeks until Christmas: the garden is still full of colour with carnations, marigolds, roses, pansies in full flower and

the thermometer reading 17°c. And the birds seem as confused as the plants – I saw a sparrow the other day with a beakful of nesting material! I only hope it gets cold enough soon enough to stop them laying any eggs.

But however confused the natural world – of which we are a part – is feeling, the weeks just keep rolling on a they always do until we hit Advent Sunday. Advent is the season of waiting and of hope, and at the moment hope is something we all need. Everywhere we look we see things that are profoundly depressing: wars, natural catastrophes, poverty (this one on our own streets with a number of people now sleeping rough in Bridport's doorways and on benches), knife crime, the rise in antisemitism... the list seems endless, and hope and happiness with life seem like a distant dream.

But in the midst of all this despair hope can be found. Look at the number of people in our home town who give up so much of their time (and money) to help; people who run the food banks, those who serve hot meals to all who come to their door on most days of the week; those volunteers, often elderly, who lug heavy suitcases of donated clothes to different locations on different days so those who can't afford clothes can have what they need – and countless others, often unseen, who are good neighbours or who dip into their own, often meagre pockets to help those worse off. I was talking the other day to a volunteer who seems to spend almost all their time helping out at one place or another, and I asked when they had time to follow any of their own extensive list of hobbies.

The answer was: "I don't have much time to do the things I love, but I wouldn't be comfortable giving myself the luxury of time when there are so many people who need so much. It just wouldn't be right." That answer lights a beacon of hope — and makes me question whether I am doing enough, or just selfishly enjoying my own agenda.

I think it might inspire us all to take a close look at our lives and see whether we, in our own ways, are beacons of hope. We can't all be doing all the physical things, but we can all stop and talk to people and listen to them whether they are rough sleepers, at food banks or just people who desperately need a friendly ear.



Not having anyone to talk to, to share worries with or tell of a lovely experience is now thought to be as bad for our health as many physical illnesses – and this is particularly true at Christmas time when memories may surface of happy past Christmases and of loved ones no longer with us.

This is why the Christmas Day lunch is so important - it provides a space for people to share some of the day with other people who might otherwise not see anyone. Fellowship and food are two of the most essential things for humankind's wellbeing. And the number of people who willingly give up a large part of Christmas day with their families to come to BUC is amazing: they come to give lifts to those who need them; to serve the meal; to help with anything that needs doing; and, most importantly, to sit with our guests and chat and make them feel welcome. For me this certainly lights a beacon of hope and these people deserve all our thanks: surely this is what celebrating Christmas is all about, not just using lovely comforting words in church, but living Jesus' command to look after one another and "love, as I have loved you".

So on that note of hope I will wish everyone a happy, peaceful and blessed Christmas and a peaceful and fulfilled 2025. My wish for the new year is that we may all be a bit more aware of our local needs and offer whatever help we can. We can't change the world, but every small act of kindness and love can make our community a better and happier place.

The devotion of the people was truly humbling, and it made me reflect on my own faith. Would I be prepared to give so much of my time and sacrifice so much for others? It made me once again appreciate just how

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


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
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
