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Living by the Olympic Movement's principles

I'm sure many of us enjoyed watching this summer's Olympic Games in Paris: a wonderful sporting occasion with everyone trying their best and achieving personal, or team, bests and even a medal.

Yet at the same time we have seen riots in our cities and the disquieting of our usual peaceful country. There has always been and always will be rivalry between competitors, between football teams, and so often that is what drives us as a species. It is only human to want to be the best for your team. But the disquieting disturbs us as laws appear to be broken, and innocent folk – including the police –

are attacked for trying to keep the peace.

Being understood is a twofold problem. Can you explain the problem and, secondly, can the listener understand what you are trying to say? Jesus had this problem throughout his life and was not without controversy. Much of what he said he put into stories, or parables, to try and get the message over. Even his closest friends misunderstood

until the first Easter.

Take for instance the time when Jesus fed the five thousand after a child had offered his two small fish and five barley loaves. No one went hungry that day, and the scraps filled twelve baskets. Jesus then moved on and the crowds followed. Did they follow because they were fed, or because they were entranced by him? Jesus then said: "I am the bread of life. Whoever believes in me will never be hungry, never be thirsty." The Greek word for bread is 'artos', which means subsistence. In The Lord's Prayer it means "Give us today enough food to eat" – not a bellyful three times a day, but enough to live on healthily.

So what did Jesus mean by "I am the bread of life"? He simply meant that by believing in him, his word, his way of self-sacrifice for the good of others, we will have a full meaningful life, not only here on earth but afterwards in his nearer presence.

The goal of the Olympic Movement is to contribute to building a peaceful and better world by educating youth through sport, practised without discrimination of any kind and in the Olympic spirit. This requires mutual understanding and an ethos of

friendship, solidarity and fair play.

If we follow this goal throughout our lives, we are in effect following what Jesus taught us: the building up of peace, mutual understanding, and a spirit of friendship and fair play in life. It means not being discriminatory.

A recent visitor to West Bay was having a bad day. His arm was heavily bandaged,

and I watched as after putting sugar in his coffee he tried to put the top on a disposable cup with his other hand. No joy – it went everywhere and he stormed off. My family were next in the queue. We got him a new coffee and sugar, plus our own order, then headed off after him. We found him sitting having a grumble to his wife. When he saw us with a replacement coffee, however, his face beamed, and his wife's face beamed, too. He thanked us profusely, but we just said we saw your problem and tried to help, but you walked off. Our actions helped a visitor feel welcomed, feel loved and valued as a fellow human being.

Whatever you do in life, think of others and respect the ways in which they are different from you. Have empathy with whoever you meet and build up a spirit of friendship and peace. *Graham Purse*

Bridport is Dorset's 'Town of Culture' 2024

Bridport, the inaugural Town of Culture in Dorset, is enjoying an extraordinary sixmonth celebration of creative community collaboration and artistic expression with a myriad of events.

Running until December, it is an initiative spearheaded by Bridport Town Council in partnership with Bridport Arts Centre, Bridport Youth and Community Centre, Bridport Museum, the Lyric Theatre and many of the town's independent makers, creatives, businesses and artists.

Bridport 24's programme of events launched over the first weekend in July, featuring performances in Buckydoo Square, the return of The Portrait Challenge, kite-making sessions by Kites for Schools and a night of music and dance from reggae and dancehall label Greensleeves that literally made the Arts Centre vibrate.

Over the summer a range of fine art and exhibitions celebrated the heritage and culture of the town and surrounding countryside. The George Biles 'King of Signwriters' exhibition was hugely popular and brought memories flooding back for many. Sladers Yard's annual summer print show will continue until mid-September, and the Small World Festival, a brand-new event, will take place in the Arts Centre and the Community Orchard on 14 September. Banners and flags celebrating the cultural diversity of Bridport have been installed across town.

A key focus is a skills development programme for young adults to ensure their voices are represented and their perspectives amplified. There is a core team of 12 young adults now working together as the Town of Culture Initiative for Young Adults (TOCIYA). These young people, who have very different lived experiences and backgrounds, are linked with individual experts and organisations on a bespoke basis to enable their personal and professional development.

TOCIYA performed at the opening event and have since installed the Piano of Joy in the foyer of the Arts Centre. They have a programme of events including dance, street art, spoken word and visual arts, performances at St Michael's Vintage Markets and a two-day takeover of Bridport Arts Centre planned for

November. One of the participants, Lily, says: "Being part of TOCIYA has led me to feel more confident in myself and my passions."

In Asker Meadows a pavilion has been constructed by young people using locally sourced and reclaimed materials under the creative auspices of Common Practice, a Bridport design studio that works to reconnect people to the productive landscapes around them. The pavilion is available until the end of September both as an informal and bookable gathering space. After that, the seating – made using rammed earth and planks from the Foundry Lea felled trees – will remain, but the higher frame structure made from locally grown Douglas fir will be removed and reused.

A central ambition of the Town of Culture programme is to increase collaboration between creatives, artists and cultural organisations and allow them to come together to share ideas and build a community of support. Bridport's Culture Cafe – a space for anyone involved in the creative sector – will be launching in September in the cafe space at Bridport Arts Centre. It's free to attend with no set agenda and will take place 7–9 pm on 19 September, 24 October, 21 November and 19 December.

Welcoming the new parish safeguarding officer

Wendy Thorogood has joined the Parish of Bridport team as its parish safeguarding officer (PSO). This vital voluntary role is central to ensuring the safety and wellbeing of children and vulnerable adults within the church community and its activities.

Wendy has had a long career in nursing and child protection. She writes: "Safeguarding adults and children is everybody's business. We all have a role to play in ensuring that everyone in our community is treated with dignity and respect, can make informed decisions about their lives without being subject to undue pressure, and will be protected from harm and abuse wherever possible. In my role as PSO I am here to help and guide you through your concerns.

"I moved to Bridport 13 years ago to take up the role of designated lead nurse consultant for safeguarding adults and children across Dorset. This was a position I had held in Kent and nationally, and as a director for the Association of Child Protection Professionals I still work on peer reviews and investigations nationally.

"Safeguarding has been woven through my career. I trained at Guy's Hospital in London, then specialised in intensive care as a cardiac nurse. I married and moved

to Kent where I worked on a special care baby unit. This led to a deeper interest in safeguarding and a master's in child and adult protection. Over the years I have been part of policy, training and staff development for the NHS. I'm now retired, although I have continued doing various reviews, training and supervision.

"Safeguarding means early help and prevention. When working with vulnerable people, you can change their lives for the better with the right early help and support. I have many good news cases! Don't get stuck in the process, always ask for help, and remember: it takes a village to raise a family."

Bell celebrations continue at St Mary's Bridport

This year is the centenary of the recasting of the bells at St Mary's, and the church is continuing its celebrations into the autumn.



The next tower open day is on Saturday 7 September, 10am to 12.30pm. This is a chance for members of the public to visit the tower and even ring

the bells. Coffee and cake will be served in the church. On Thursday 3 October at 7pm there will be two fascinating talks about Bridport history. First, Richard Balson will present 'The butcher and the bells of Bridport'. This talk will take listeners on a journey from 1515 to the present day, describing how life and butchery have changed, and how England's oldest family business has survived plagues, fires, floods, wars, recessions and health scares over 509 years – and is still here serving the good people of Bridport.

Afterwards, ringer and retired academic Alastair Forbes will trace the story of the St Mary's bells in the context of the history of the church, town and nation.

Tickets for this evening event are £5 from Balson's Butchers, 9 West Allington, or on the door.

Three more events are planned for next month. On Saturday 12 October at 12.30pm, the ringers will ring a full peal to repeat the first full peal rung on these bells in 1924. This promises to be a very special occasion.

On Wednesday 16 October at 7pm, there will be celebratory bingo in Bridport Youth and Community Centre, Gundry Lane, and on Saturday 19 October at 2pm there will be a free concert by the Wessex Women choir. More details in the October magazine.






Local author Sylvia Stafford's new book is an illustrated journal of a year – 2012 – in the life of West Bay.

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Let's reduce our reliance on single-use plastics

During September the Parish of Bridport is taking a look at its use of single-use plastic.

Plastics have been around for only 60–70 years and have transformed our lives. Light, durable, versatile and cheap to produce, plastic is all around us. It's in the products we use, the clothes we wear, wrapped around the food we eat and in items that some of us may not even be aware of. There are downsides, however. Plastic production uses chemicals derived from oil, natural gas or coal, and is a major source of greenhouse gas emissions. And plastic takes hundreds of years to decompose, ultimately turning into microplastic particles that never fully disappear.

Clearly much bolder action on plastic pollution is needed at all levels. There is no time like the present to commit a month to going 'plastic free', discover ways to reduce our personal plastic consumption and even advocate for policies to reduce plastic pollution globally (consider, for instance, the UK ban on free single-use plastic bags, which led to a 98% reduction in use).

However, despite widespread efforts, much of our plastic waste is simply dumped. Every year the UK produces 2.5 to 5 million tonnes of plastic waste,

Help local water voles

Water voles (misnamed 'Ratty' in Wind in the Willows) have declined nationally by about 95% since the 1990s. This is mainly due to habitat loss and predation by mink.

A project funded by Dorset National Landscape (formerly Dorset Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty) is now laying the foundations for the restoration of water voles to the Brit catchment.



There is still a colony at Asker Meadows and project organisers hope to find them elsewhere.

Volunteers are urgently needed to cover more of the River Asker. They will work in pairs to walk about 1km along the river and its streams in both autumn 2024 and spring 2025 to assess suitability of locations for water voles. Each walk would take about two hours, on any day that suits. No prior knowledge is required.

A meeting on 2 September in Askerswell Village Hall will give volunteers more information and a simple reporting system. Email Howard Atkinson (*hj_askerswell@btinternet.com*) to get involved.



over 50% of which is exported. Once overseas, plastic waste continues to cause harm. In March 2022 the governments of 175 countries agreed to start work on a landmark global treaty on plastic pollution. This treaty would cover the full lifecycle of plastics, from the extraction of oil and gas through to plastic production, design, use and waste management. Negotiations will conclude by the end of this year, so this is a critical opportunity to encourage the new Labour government to champion this crucial treaty.

If we take seriously the instruction to "Love your neighbour as yourself" (Mark 12:31), the action of sending 'our problem' elsewhere must be challenged. Our global brothers and sisters not only face the greatest impact of climate change, they are also suffering directly from the effects of our overconsumption of plastic. Banning the export of plastic waste would force UK bodies to take more dramatic steps and necessitate a reduction in the reliance on single-use plastic.

Locally there are several ways to reject single-use plastic. We can buy many things without packaging, take bottles to be refilled with liquid products and even take our own containers to some shops to fill with loose food items such as pasta and rice. But there are still many barriers to changing our shopping habits, and the greatest of these is possibly how we think.

For September, please take another look at your own consumption of plastic. You'll be surprised how easy it is to find a small change that you can make. Once you have made the first step on your pathway of plastic reduction, the next one will usually be much easier. There are lots of ideas on how to get started on these three websites:

The Bridge: Anne, you've been mayor once before, in 2017–18. Has anything about the role changed since then?

Anne Rickard: The role itself hasn't changed at all. It's very special and a lovely position to have. My mayoral routine varies but on average I go to about three events a week. I have my own secretary who looks after my diary and organises events with back-up from the town council staff. They all work well together – it's a great team of people who love their jobs. Everyone's doing it for the town and nobody's on their high horse!

TB: The town council itself has changed, though, with the absorption of the former parish councils and creation of new 'wards'. What does that mean for Bridport residents?

AR: Yes, the new council is twice the size! The new structure just makes sense and will draw us all closer together. My husband Dave [also a town councillor and former mayor] and I have lived in Bothenhampton for 18 years and have always felt we were in Bridport, never a village or separate parish.



I understand that some people are unhappy about the increase in the precept element of their council tax – it's always been higher in central Bridport, and that rate now applies across the board – but overall this change is absolutely fair and the right way to go. We should expect to share the costs of running the town we all use and love.

Bridport Town Council has paid staff, and much of the parish work was done by volunteers, who were often not elected for lack of people coming forward. An election confirms that your electorate have put trust in you, and I also think prospective councillors should make their political affiliation and views clear, as it gives voters some idea how their representatives are likely to react to various issues. I'm very pleased to be part of our fully elected council.

We have a really good set of councillors now. We've lost a few through age or ill health, so new people have replaced them, bringing new ideas. There's always a bedding-in period, but the council looks exciting, with some very clever people who are keen to be active and make a difference. *TB:* In your first term as mayor you declared Bridport to be a Rights Respecting [RR] Town – the first in the country. How did this come about and what does it mean?

AR: The idea came from pupils at Colfox School who were fed up with the assumptions people were making about them because of their age - they would often be refused entry to shops, for example. Many schools across the country are RR, and it has a really positive effect on young people's behaviour and attitudes, as they consider the responsibilities that go hand in hand with their rights. Our young people went a step further and asked the council to consider widening the RR approach across the town. Now, in every process and every project, we all ask ourselves: Does this 'feel' RR? It's very important to me.

TB: You've chosen three local causes as your mayoral charities for the year. What are they and why are you supporting them?

AR: Two of the charities – Bridport Youth & Community Centre (BYCC) and Home-Start - benefit young people, something that's close to my heart. Their work reflects the town's Rights Respecting ethos, too. Home-Start supports families with young children, while BYCC provides activities, events and clubs for young people. My third charity is Read Easy, which helps adults improve their literacy skills. I used to be a Read Easy reading coach until I just got too busy, and I have so much respect for the important work they do. I wanted to support all three of these excellent causes. \rightarrow

TB: What are the biggest challenges facing the people of Bridport today?

AR: There are multiple challenges – energy price hikes, the housing shortage, climate change... we need the whole system to start working together. Now we have a different central government, as well as a Lib Dem-led Dorset Council and town council, I hope things can change.

One example is the planning laws: our old buildings need insulation and better windows, and there need to be fewer restrictions so this can happen. Also, it's hard to get new homes built when there's more money in retirement properties and homes for elderly people. We need young people to live here and run things, but so many either can't afford it or can't find a suitable place. We're facing a dearth of opportunities for young people to stay in their home town. The new government will impose housing targets, which gives me hope. We need to be able to make things happen, although it won't be quick or easy.

I'd like to add that the town's surveyor, Daryl Chambers, and our town clerk, Will Austin, have for a long time managed to make things happen despite some tricky planning obstacles. They're part of a very strong team and do really well. *TB:* How did you come to settle in Bridport and get involved in public life?

AR: I'm from Sidcup, Kent, and Dave grew up in London. We lived in the South East for years, near the M25, and we knew we'd like to move to a different area at some point. When our circumstances changed we took a leap and moved to Martinstown, where we lived 'the good life' in a very special old house. We kept chickens, pigs, orphan lambs – it was a big adventure! My older son and daughter had already left home but this was a wonderful place for our younger son, Chris, to grow up.

It was music, and the lack of a motorway, that first drew us towards Dorset, and after those fruitful years in Martinstown, we realised Bridport was calling. Chris had got himself a job in a computer shop, and then got into the music scene. He loved it - he's an ace keyboard player, even if I say so myself – and the older musicians were very welcoming and encouraging. We discovered the heart of this town and just had to move here. We felt the eccentricity, differing opinions, sense of humour, sense of never being afraid to be slightly bonkers and the freedom to just be yourself would suit us



well, and we felt welcomed from the start. The local Lib Dems wanted Dave to stand as a town councillor, and in the end I got involved too.

TB: Do you have any passions outside local government and improving people's lives?

MC: Definitely music, although I don't perform so much now. I've always loved singing and I sang with Orpington Junior Singers when I was young - we did concerts, festivals and even some radio and TV appearances. That was my life from the age of 12 into my 20s, and after that I always found it difficult to join another choir. When Dave and I got together, he introduced me to the folk scene. What an eve- (or ear-!) opener this was! We performed in several different line-ups, all over the country and even made several recordings - we had so much fun.

When we came to Dorset, I was asked to join an all-female trio, Dangerous Curves, and we ended up performing together for 12 years including a trip to the USA. We sang close harmony with lots of comedy. All this gave me so much confidence and to be honest I think it made me a different person.

Music is definitely a lifelong passion, even though I don't perform now. Dave and I still jive!

At this time of year, it is good to pause and reflect on what happens at St Mary's apart from church services...

The churchyard

The stunning display of wildflowers and flax recently hit the headlines in the Bridport News. This is a remarkable transformation as the space where they now flourish was previously home to a rather large and not very attractive sprawling shrub that had become the focus of antisocial behaviour. Many thanks to the St Mary's Gardening Group for making this happen.

Tots Time Bridport

Tots Time is a welcoming space where parents and carers can meet with others and where their children can learn to socialise, develop skills and grow in confidence, all through play. During the past year we have welcomed 59 adults – mums and dads, grandparents and childminders – and 64 children ranging in age from a few weeks to four years.

Sessions take place in St Mary's Church House Hall every Thursday during school term time, 9.30-11am, and cost £1 per adult and 50p per child.

Once the buggies and the scooters have been safely parked and fees paid, there are hot



drinks and toast and a range of play equipment and craft activities, which change each week. In the summer we use the outside play area with the sandpit and water play. Every session ends with a short singing time.

Life+Line

The Life+Line bereavement support group provides a safe, confidential space where you can talk about your bereavement, make new friends and know that others will understand a bit about what you are experiencing.

Here is a reflection on the work of Life+Line from one person's experience: "Life+Line is such an asset and in my opinion deserves to be more widely known and spoken of. In time of need I found it to be a real support. I was very low and feeling over-burdened

by the seemingly endless official and financial affairs that my husband had always looked after – accounts, bills, pensions, income tax and so forth – so to come each month to a friendly group, meeting in pleasant surroundings and with a welcoming tea/coffee and the knowledge that nothing said would go beyond that room, was such a help. Everybody listens and respects what you have to say. Tears are acceptable too, with tissues to hand. I would certainly recommend giving it a try if you are struggling. Say it all there and give your family and friends a break. I shall always be grateful for this facility."

Bridport Food Bank

For the past 13 years there has been at St Mary's a service for local people who are experiencing food poverty. Initially called Cupboard Love, it is now an independent charity and known as Bridport Food Bank. Every Wednesday from 11am to 1pm about 45 people come to collect food: enough for three meals a day for three days, including fresh bread, eggs and vegetables. Additional support is available from the Bridport Clothes Bank, First Point (for housing advice) and Citizens Advice. There is an additional session at the Bridport Youth and Community Centre on Mondays from 5 to 7pm.

How can you help? The food bank needs tinned meat, fish, soup, veg, tomatoes, fruit, and rice pudding, pasta sauce, breakfast cereal, coffee, UHT milk, jam, and toiletries and hygiene products. At present we have plenty of baked beans, pasta, tea and toothpaste.

The ward clerk writes...

Bridport's Central Ward councillors held their most recent public meeting on 24 July, chaired by Cllr Dave Rickard. Among the topics discussed was the recent introduction of a 20mph zone across the town centre.

Councillors welcomed the scheme but would like to see some more signage to highlight the lower speed limit. The meeting also heard about a potential licensing application for premises at St Michael's Trading Estate, with the



applicants outlining a possible food and small event venue. Councillors welcomed the pre-application engagement and offered advice on how to proceed.

Other topics discussed at the meeting included a proposal from Churchill Retirement Living for a development at the JC Phillips site off South Street. The council's planning committee had considered this at length and members recognised the need for wide community involvement when a planning application is submitted. There was disappointment that, for the second year in a row, town centre weeding promised for early July hadn't yet been carried out. Dorset Council member Cllr Sarah Williams undertook to pass on councillors' displeasure to the Dorset Council Highways team.

There was a request from local residents for the town council to get involved in a land ownership issue adjacent to Back Rivers Lane. More information is being sought on this subject.

Councillors recognised that the disused phone box on West Bay Road was in a poor state and unlikely to be capable of being restored for community use. BT would be asked to remove it.

The next ward meeting is on 18 September at 2pm and members of the public are encouraged to come along to hear and speak about issues affecting the centre of Bridport. Councillors will also be holding regular 'surgery' events for one-to-one conversations. You can find them at Bucky Doo Square from 11am to 1pm on the following Wednesdays: 4 September, 6 November, 15 January 2025 and 12 March 2025. If it's wet, signs will direct you to an indoor location nearby.

September gardening jobs:

Gather your harvest of fruit and veg and start planning your garden for next year; clear autumn debris to prevent pests and diseases overwintering; clean the greenhouse in preparation for winter; plant out spring cabbages and sow winter lettuce; finish planting new strawberry plants (keep watered); pot up herbs in a cool light place for use in winter; collect seeds and beans for sowing next year; clear crops once they've finished and fork over; plant new trees, shrubs, climbers and perennials; move evergreen shrubs; begin dividing overgrown perennials, lifting tender species to bring under cover; take hardwood cuttings from roses; plant spring-flowering bulbs, plant out spring-flowering biennials and plant up containers with spring bedding; sow hardy annuals to flower next year.

Featured plant of the month: helenium Helenium is a hardy, herbaceous, clump-forming perennial with daisy-type flowers. Mainly in flower from

late July often into early October as long as dead flower heads are removed. Easy culture, given a sunny position in



moist, well drained and preferably alkaline or neutral soil. It's attractive to bees.

There are several varieties, some of which have received an RHS Award of Garden Merit (AGM). Perhaps the most popular is Moorheim Beauty, with reddish orange flowers, and the variety pictured above is Sahine's Early Flowerer. Both of these are AGM. These and most varieties are approximately 3ft in height and do not normally need a stake, though this will be required for taller varieties.

Plants die down in the winter and are best lifted and divided in the autumn or early spring every three or so years. Generally pest and disease free.

Thelma's hymn notes

We Plough the Fields and Scatter

This is perhaps the best-known harvest hymn – many will remember singing it during childhood – and it has a jolly refrain after each verse. The opening verse sets the scene: We plough the fields and scatter the good seed on the land, but it is fed and watered by God's almighty hand. He sends the snow in winter, the warmth to swell the grain, the breezes and the sunshine and soft refreshing rain.

The late-18th century hymn was written by German poet and journalist Matthias Claudius, then translated into English by Jane Campbell in 1861. Miss Campbell, a vicar's daughter, was an accomplished linguist and singer who translated many German hymns into English. In 1878 she was tragically killed in a carriage accident on Dartmoor.

The melody was written in the 1790s by Johann Abraham Peter Schulz, a composer and conductor. *Thelma Pulman, organist at St Mary's Walditch*

Bradpole Ward councillors Ian Bark, Nigel Amor, Rob Casey, Anna Killick and Paddy Mooney held their first public meeting on Monday 8 July at 7pm in Bradpole Village Hall.

Cllr Bark welcomed everyone to the meeting before the councillors introduced themselves. All said they were looking forward to working closely with the community.

The meeting was well attended by residents and representatives from Seal's Cove. The main topics for discussion were: dangerous parking and excess speed in Jessopp Avenue; the licence variation application from Seal's Cove; and flooding in the ward.

Residents from Jessopp Avenue voiced concerns about the dangers caused by vehicles parking near the junction with Sea Road North and close to the bend over the bridge. They would like Dorset Council to consider further traffic calming measures, double yellow lines and a 20mph speed limit. They asked the ward councillors to look at this matter and see if they can progress any actions with Dorset Council.

Councillors explained the procedure around further traffic calming measures and said they would discuss how they might be able to help.

Representatives from Seal's Cove spoke about their licence variation application, reassuring councillors and members of the community that they would take great care to avoid causing any inconvenience to residents. They also spoke about their future regarding



the use of the paddocks that back on to Happy Valley.

Also discussed were Bradpole residents' concerns over recent flooding, particularly in Caley Way and Lee Lane. The main issue was that drains and gullies had not been regularly cleared. Residents would like Dorset Council to be more proactive than reactive.

Councillors discussed the Flood Warden Scheme with residents and encouraged them to consider becoming a flood warden for their area. Anyone wanting more information can contact me.

Throughout the meeting there were constructive comments from residents and many issues raised for councillors to consider.

The next public meeting will be on Monday 16 September at 7 pm in Bradpole Village Hall. Later activities explored how nature can bring focus, and how through stillness we all can connect with Christ's peace. Using our God's Green Acre survey, the group also thought about ways to be more eco-friendly.

Songs included Be Still and Know That I Am God, My Lighthouse, and Jesus on the Boat, and there were two 15-minute meditation sessions for children and adults, which many felt was a novel but effective way to bring a sense of inner calm.

The children enjoyed making boats and putting them on a map of the Lyme Bay Marine Protected Area while learning how this conservation project has greatly benefited our local marine environment.

At the end of the session the group received cards illustrating how to care for God's Creation and some 'net zero' actions to take at home. After prayers and a review of the afternoon, the session ended with tea for the children and their families. A big

Round and about the Bay

Bridport Gig Rowing Club held their regatta on 29 June and the weather was great. There were 17 gigs from all over the South West with good results for the hosts, who finished in third place. West Bay Community Forum held their committee meeting where issues around West Bay are raised. I am afraid irresponsible parking reared its head again around Chesil House and also bikers parking on the green outside the church when the Sea Sunday service was due to be held. Between one and two thousand people sit in the Large Meeting Room, with the 'clerks' at the table to record the process. Any member can stand and be chosen to speak on the subject in hand. After some time there is a silence and the clerks gather the words spoken around the hall into a direction and a minute of record is offered.

Sometimes more speakers have then stood and spoken their ministry, and the minute is amended. In the end it is not consensus but guidance that is sought. This is the Quaker business method, which is practised nationally, regionally and locally. It requires self-discipline and generosity as well as time, but it has worked for well over 300 years.

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




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
